ENGINEER REPORT

PUBLIC WORKS – ACTION ITEMS

1. Atlantic County Open Space Trust Funds – Round 8 (11-01070)

As requested by the Parks and Recreation Committee we have prepared a proposal to complete the survey, preliminary assessment and administrative work required by the County agreement for the following three parcels:

- 1. Block 3505 Lot 11 – Linda Avenue adjacent to Cedar Branch Stream (2.6 acres). Cost: \$9,030.00
- 2. Block 4009 Lots 5, 6, 7 – Reading Avenue – 8<sup>th</sup> Street intersection (17.14 acres). Cost: \$12,435.00
- 3. Block 4204 Lot 28 – 7<sup>th</sup> Street adjacent to recreation park. (0.24 acres) Cost: \$5390.00

We have attached a copy of the proposals noting the scope of work for each parcel for Council's consideration. There were additional properties that were funding by the County under Round 8; however, it was the Committee's direction to concentrate on the first three properties at this time. As authorized by the Committee, we will provide a cost estimate for Council's review to complete the survey, site assessment and administrative work associated with the other properties at a subsequent Council meeting.

2. 2009 State Aid Application

We received notice from the State that they will be accepting applications for 2009 Municipal Aid Funding. The applications, estimates, reports, maps, etc. must be submitted by June 20, 2008. This being the case a resolution designating which roadway(s) the Town would like to include in this year's application must be considered for adoption at this Council meeting. This year the State has required that each municipality file their application electronically online through their SAGE Program (System for Administering Grants Electronically). Unfortunately, the new system requires much more information and detail in order to assist them in their evaluation process. In review of the system we are estimating that it will cost approximately \$3,200.00 per roadway application (priority requested by the Town for funding consideration). Our office

has briefly discussed what roadways the Town may wish to consider for funding consideration for the 2009 application process with the PWT Committee. The suggested applications are noted below.

- Priority #1 – Municipal Aid – Fourth Street Phase II – French Street to Fairview Avenue.
- Priority #2 – Discretionary Aid – Myrtle Street/Pine Road – Route 206 to existing paved surface of Pine Road.

Under last year’s application the Town requested applications be submitted for Pleasant Street section #2 and Fourth Street. Last year the Town applied and did receive funding for Fourth Street reconstruction but did not obtain enough funds to complete the entire length of roadway. Council may wish to consider applying for an additional allotment this year. This being the case, there is a portion of the information which could be utilized from last year’s report to submit an application for funding consideration within this year’s program. The State normally considers a maximum dollar amount for funding consideration totaling \$150,000.00. It would be our recommendation to Mayor and Council that they consider placing a funding request for at least one roadway under the 2009 Municipal and Discretionary Aid Program. Should the Mayor and Town Council request that an application be submitted for Priority #1 as noted above we would estimate the cost to complete the application under the new State Aid application process to be \$2,100.00 since we have some information available through last year’s application. The cost to complete the Discretionary Aid application for Myrtle Street/Pine Road would be \$2900.00. We will seek direction from Mayor and Council related to this issue before proceeding further.

Motion by Councilperson Marino, seconded by Councilperson Vitalo, authorize ARH to prepare both the 2009 Municipal and Discretionary Aid applications on behalf of the Town to the NJDOT for the roadway(s) selected.

Councilperson Bertino requested the priorities be acted upon separately.

3. Community Development Funds, 2006 ADA Curb/Walk Replacement, Washington Street Phase I Reconstruction (11-40026):

We have contacted the Atlantic County Improvement Authority as to whether this funding still exists for use by the Town. It was indicated that an allotment of \$69,804.00 still remains in effect for use by the Town. The projects that were originally established for use of the funds were as follows:

- A. Completion of the remaining ADA curbs and ramps within the Town.
- B. Balance of funds to be used for reconstruction of Washington Street between 12<sup>th</sup> Street and Orchard Street. This would include replacement of curb and sidewalk, drainage work, replacement of water and sanitary sewer, main and laterals, etc.

It is our understanding that within Ordinance 16-07 there is approximately \$150,000.00 set aside to complete these improvements. We were requested by the Public Works and Transportation Committee to provide a proposal to complete the required survey, design and permitting work for this project. We will prepare a proposal for Council's consideration to complete the survey work, design, plans, specifications, and bid package for Council's consideration. We will try to have this available for Monday night's Council meeting after review with the PWT Committee.

Motion by Councilperson Wuillermin, seconded by Councilperson Bertino, approve ARH proposal for completion of the field work, design tasks, specifications and bidding process for the Roadway Reconstruction and Utility Installation for the section of Washington Street between Route 54 and Orchard Street and the completion of the remaining ADA ramp replacement, total cost not to exceed \$18,900.00.

#### SEWER & WATER INFORMATION ITEMS

4. **Vine Street & Second Street (11-40033):**

The project was awarded to Jersey Construction on May 8, 2008. A preconstruction meeting has been scheduled for May 14, 2008. It is anticipated the Contractor will be mobilized within the next couple of weeks.

5. **Pine, Basin & Oak Road Water Main Extension, Well Contamination (11-30138):**

As authorized last meeting, we contacted Alan Mounier and requested that he begin the Cultural Resource Study for the area requested by the Pinelands Commission within the project limits. Once we receive the report from Mr. Mounier we will submit same to the Commission along with the plan revisions as requested in hopes of receiving a development approval for the project. When the development approval is received we will then submit to NJDEP for the water main extension permit. We will keep Council informed of further progress.

We received a letter from Akshay Parikh from NJDEP regarding a request from a property owner on Pine Road to keep his individual well for irrigation purposes only associated with the farm use operation. The NJDEP letter noted that they have no objection to the waiver request provided the conditions noted within their review letter are accepted by the municipality and the property owner. We have forwarded a copy of those conditions to the affected property owner for review and comment. Once we receive a response from the property owner we will review the conditions with the PWT Committee for recommended action by the Mayor and Council.

6. **1.5 Million Gallon Water Storage Tank Painting (11-30136):**

We sent the contracts to Corrosion Control for execution as a result of the award recommendation provided by Mayor and Council at their last meeting. We are awaiting return of the contracts so they can be executed by the Town Officials. As discussed last meeting, the actual work associated with the tank painting will occur in late September/early October so the summer water needs of the Town are not affected. We will prepare a proposal for the PWT Committee to solicit price quotes for the inspection of the tank by a certified tank inspection firm. ARH will also prepare a proposal to request price quotes to complete construction management and administration of the project. We hope to have the ARH proposal available for the next Council meeting.

7. **Moss Mill Road/White Horse Pike Utility Extension (11-50124):**

We are in the process of compiling the plans, specifications and NJDEP forms for the submission to the State in order to receive the necessary permits for the project. The solicitor is trying to obtain the

necessary easements for the project so that the project can be bid as soon as the permits are obtained. We will keep Council informed of further progress.

**8. Southwest Hammonton – Sanitary Sewer Service (11-50130.01):**

As authorized, our survey and environmental staff have completed additional locations and elevations within the project area. We would hope to have a base plan so the design can begin shortly. We are still waiting for one response from one of the property owners in the area in order to seek permission to file an application that would include extension of sanitary sewer across their property

We will also discuss with the PWT Committee the possibility of making a submission for the entire project area for permitting purposes only at this time while only seeking permission for construction of the Phase I portion of the project area. We will provide the PWT Committee with a cost estimate to complete permitting plans for the entire project area using available existing data developed some year's ago for permitting purposes only and also include providing supplementary and check information in areas where existing data needs to be updated or acquired.

It is believed that the Solicitor will be contacting the attorney for Mortellite Family Partnership regarding the cost sharing agreement for the Phase I portion of the project. The solicitor will be able to provide an update to Council on this matter.

**9. Getty Gas Station Remediation (11-50128):**

We met with representatives from the Tyree Company who represent Getty along with the Sewer Superintendent related to sampling parameters, discharge volumes, and schedule for start of the remediation work. We also discussed the need to clean up the site from its present condition. We will be discussing the recommendations developed at the meeting with the PWT Committee. We will keep Council informed of further progress. Should there be a need to modify the initial agreement established between the Town and Getty we will return to Council for formal action.

**10. Well #5-#7 (11-30139.03):**

As previously reported, Well #7 has been completed and sampling has been performed by NJDEP. All test results have passed with the exception of lead. The first sample recorded a level of 17 mg/l whereas the threshold is 15 mg/l. The second test conducted by the NJDEP recorded a level of 13 mg/l. Although this sample was not above the MCL, but relatively close, NJDEP required a third confirming sample. The sample was taken on Monday, May 12, 2008. The verbal report received from the Lab for lead samples were as follows:

- After purging the well 13.1 mg/L
- 15 minute re-sample 9.33 mg/L
- 30 minute re-sample 8.0 mg/L

It appears that since the samples are under but still close the DEP will place a monitoring requirement in the final permit. As a check, samples were taken from Well #5 using the same protocol. There were no detectable limits reported on the Well #5 sampling. In speaking with the well driller, we will be investigating the oil lube component and it is likely the levels may be a derivative of the brass faucet where the sample was taken.

We will investigate and conclude. The fact that Well #5 has no detectable limits indicates that one of the two proposed reasons stated above may be the cause. All other factors associated with the permit to operate have been satisfied. The most recent lead sampling reports have been provided to the NJDEP and we await release of the permit to operate.

Progress continues on the remaining items associated with the Lincoln Street complex. Pending completion, a start up session with the Water Department staff to demonstrate the new equipment will be conducted before returning the wells to service.

**11. Water Allocation (11-30088):**

Major Modification Application:

As previously reported the aquifer testing report was submitted to NJDEP on March 26, 2008. There has been no response from the NJDEP at this writing. It typically takes a few months for a reply.

Future Well:

At the next PWTC meeting we will discuss a proposal to initiate the testwell proceedings on Well #8.

**12. Boyer Avenue Land Application Site – Drip Irrigation (11-50127):**

We prepared a preliminary outline of a report to submit to Pinelands that will address each of the observations generated by USGS and include other strategies such as drip irrigation and adaptive reuse. Due to more pressing issues this matter has been temporarily delayed from further discussion. At an upcoming PWTC meeting, discussion will continue since it involves the potential of hiring additional consultants and implementing a testing protocol.

**PUBLIC WORKS – INFORMATION ITEMS****13. Atlantic County Open Space Trust Funds – Round 7 (11-01068):**

As authorized at the special Council meeting we have drafted a letter to Renee Fehr, Atlantic County, regarding the two properties noted below:

- A. Grand Street site, Block 3706, part of Lot 4
- B. St. Martin Church site, Block 3001, part of Lot 41

We provided the draft letter to the solicitor for review and comment prior to forwarding same to the County. The basic contents were as follows:

- 1. Regarding the Grand Street property, a request for reallocation of these funds to another parcel in the Town was made.
- 2. Regarding the St. Martin parcel, a request for time extension to complete the required survey, subdivision, environmental assessment, etc. was requested for a period of one year to June 2009.

**14. Redistribution of Atlantic County Open Space Trust Funds Round 6 Walmer Street/Chestnut Street Properties (11-01064):**

ARH provided a cost estimate to complete a Preliminary Assessment (PA) of this property and the adjacent parcels for the purpose of confirming the environmental integrity of same. The cost to complete the PA is estimated to be \$3,750.00, and would be completed in accordance with the State's criteria. This study should provide information to assist the Mayor and Council as to whether these properties should be considered for acquisition and if further testing will be required to make that determination.

At the last Council meeting action of this item was held until the solicitor could contact representatives of the Wescoat tract to seek permission to enter onto their property to complete the tests. Once the status of that inquiry is finalized, we will ask Council's permission to act on the proposal so the work could be scheduled.

**15. Myrtle Street Survey/Pinelands Inquiries (11-40025.02):**

We met with the Pinelands Commission regarding the conceptual plan for improvements of Myrtle Street between Route 206 and Pine Road and the section of Pine Road presently unpaved. Although there were a number of concerns related to wetlands, stormwater storage and depth to seasonal high water table, it is believed that a design could be perfected that would address the items of concern. If agreeable, we can provide Mayor and Council with a cost estimate to complete a design for the project and file an application with NJDOT to request an allotment of discretionary aid to complete the roadway reconstruction. We will await further direction from Mayor and Council related to this matter. This item is also further noted with the 2009 State Aid application of the Engineer's Report.

**16. Route 54/Bellevue Avenue Utilities (11-50120):**

By this reading our office should have made a submission to NJDEP for a BSDW permit. Our office will now work to complete the final bidding documents. It is anticipated we will advertise for bid and make a recommendation of award subject to the receipt of the BSDW permit.

**17. Transportation Enhancements, Bellevue Ave-12<sup>th</sup> Street Improvements (11-40011):  
(No Status Change)**

The NJDOT requested information related to items of work that were not completed. Marandino will return to the site to address all of the NJDOT's comments. However, the Central Avenue contractor will be installing the trees that are currently missing along this project route.

**18. Central Avenue – Walkways (11-40027):**

We made a submission to the County related to what we view as essential items of work on the roadway project that will allow the installation of the new walkway. The County has agreed to the installation of additional curb in select locations, which has been installed by P&A under the roadway contract. To date we have been unsuccessful in attempts to discuss the entire project with the County. We have been seeking conceptual approval from the County for the final location of the walkway.

**19. Central Avenue Roadway Reconstruction Project (11-40027):**

The Contractor returned to the site and has completed remaining storm sewer and concrete work. The Contractor was scheduled to move to the completion of the roadway work however SJ Gas has decided to replace their old main from Bachelor Lane to the White Horse Pike. Until the gas main replacement is complete, the roadway work is on hold. We will keep Council informed of further progress.

**20. Eleventh Street Park Diversion (11-75002):**

Our office is currently working to have a sign approved by Green Acres, to complete the application packet and to schedule the public hearing. Once the sign is approved and placed on the site, we will be able to continue with the diversion process.

**21. Hammonton Lake Park (11-90028):**

Previously we reported a resubmission to Pinelands was completed and we anticipate receiving comments from the Commission around the second week of May. We are currently waiting for those comments. While the review process is underway we are planning to meet with Atlantic City Electric to determine the full scope of utility replacement that is needed to allow the parking lot to be constructed.

**22. Fourth Street Reconstruction (11-40034):  
(No Status Change)**

The NJDOT has set an award deadline of July 18, 2009. While preliminary work is complete, it is anticipated the construction phase of this project will not commence till either late this year or next year. It is our intent to complete the design and be ready to bid when the Town is ready. It is our understanding that additional funding will be needed for this project. We have included within the 2009 State Aid Application of this report information regarding this item and will seek Council's direction as to whether a submission for a Phase II allotment should be made to the NJDOT.

**23. Boyer Avenue Recreation - Phase III (11-75003):**

At the last Council meeting Horner and Canter (H&C) was authorized to complete the traffic study to accompany the submission to the Pinelands Commission. Currently H&C are collecting data with Automatic Traffic Recorders. This is anticipated to take place until at least May 23, 2008. After that is complete, a minimum of two more weeks will be needed to complete the calculations and report. Barring any setbacks the submission to the Pinelands Commission should take place in June.

**24. Public Works Building (11-10100.108):**

As previously reported, the preliminary sketch outlining the Town's replacement needs was forwarded to NJEDA. We received acknowledgement from the EDA of their receipt and are awaiting their review to determine the limit of funding that can be applied to the cost of the facility in terms of the land value of the Town owned parcel needed for the State Office Building. We anticipated receiving feedback by mid May, but have not as of this writing. In speaking with David Nuse of EDA on May 12, 2008, he indicated the Department of Treasury is reviewing the outline and determining cost in order to give us a timely reply.

Solicitor responded yes, the Board understands that. The amendment would only be for times when police officers could be provided but are intentionally withheld from servicing the school.

Howard Paynter – 39 Lahn Lane, Blueberry Ridge Development

Mr. Paynter passed out papers for Mayor and Council reference. He stated he reviewed Hammonton's code and Pulte's requirements prior to moving here. He enjoys exercising with his dogs and understood walking them on the sidewalk was allowable. He advised he is currently having a dispute with another property owner in his neighborhood concerning his walking his dog on the sidewalk by her property. Councilman Barberio questioned ages of riders?

Mr. Kleshick advised 12-25.

Solicitor questioned times of track use?

Mr. Kleshick advised sometimes 12-6 pm

Jim MacLane – 412 Bellevue Avenue

Mr. MacLane referenced Councilman Wuillermin's report inwhere he reported on public works working with airport committee. He suggested an airport committee be formed to hold public meetings and allow public input.

Mayor DiDonato advised there is currently an active airport committee and all committee meetings are open to the public

Valentine Cortez - 214 Francis Street

Mr. Cortez stated he is also in favor of ATV use on one's own property. He stated he built his home on land so that his children could ride ATV's under his supervision.

Solicitor questioned group activities?

Mr. Cortez responded maximum of 5 riders at one time.

Solicitor questioned acreage and does it butt up against Mr. Haskins property?

Mr. Cortez responded 3.5 acres and it does not butt up against the property.

Mr. Spinelli spoke in favor of ATV use and stated he and his neighbors all have ATV's and ride on each others properties (with permission) and there has never been a problem or complaint.

Councilman Vitalo made a suggestion that we refer this matter to another pre advertised date and time to hold a public forum with Brian Howell, Solicitor, mediating same. He believes both the complainant and the ATV riders have made legitimate statements and he feels all can come together to discuss their feelings and hopefully compromise on this issue.

John Margerum - Grand Street

Mr. Margerum stated he was opposed to any ATV ban. He bought his ATV in the State of New Jersey and with new laws he is limited on using same and it seems that soon he won't be allowed to use his ATV at all.

Mayor DiDonato stated we heard everyone loud and clear and concurred with Councilman Vitalo's suggestion.

Dale LeClare - 51 Braddock Avenue

Mr. LeClare stated he owns an ATV shop on Black Horse Pike in Folsom and he feels he represents ATV users. He feels people are riding on their own property to comply with the law and now it seems they will not be allowed to do that either. He feels we are being punished. He feels any ban will increase illegal riding on state property, public road, farmers fields etc. He mentioned the placement of a silencer on the ATV to eliminate the noise.
